Who We Are

Girl Scouts of the Green and White Mountains is one of 109 councils chartered by Girl Scouts of the USA, the world's leading organization dedicated solely to girls, where, in an accepting and nurturing environment, girls build character and skills for success. In partnership with caring adults, girls develop qualities to serve them all their lives: strong values, social conscience, and conviction about their potential and self-worth.

Our Vision

Girl Scouts of the Green and White Mountains is recognized throughout New Hampshire and Vermont as a leading expert on girls. Our innovative leadership programs help girls discover, connect and take action as they develop strong values, a social conscience, and a deep sense of self and their potential.

What We Do

We serve 16,000 girls throughout New Hampshire and Vermont. With the guidance of more than 5,200 dedicated and trained volunteers, girls discover the fun, friendship, and power of girls together. Through hundreds of programs offered each year, girls develop their leadership potential through activities that enable them to **discover** their values, skills and the world; **connect** with others in a multicultural environment; and **take action** to make a difference in the world.

Our Structure

Membership is open to all girls 5-17 who subscribe to the Girl Scout Promise and Law. We are part of a worldwide family of 10 million girls and adults in 145 countries. Girl Scouting was founded in 1912 by Juliette Gordon Lowe.

Adult members volunteer as troop leaders, community administrators, organizers, public relations coordinators, trainers, board members, and specialists in child development, adult and outdoor education, and administration.

How Girls Enjoy Girl Scouting

Approximately 80% of Girl Scouts participate through traditional troops led by volunteers. Many others participate through after-school programs lasting six to eight weeks, or through one-week school vacation activity centers. We offer day and resident camping each summer. Special interest groups may meet monthly.

When girls cannot come to us, we bring the program to them: at Sanders Cottage (part of Youth Development Services, Manchester, New Hampshire); Our House for Girls in Dover, New Hampshire; Antrim Girls Home, Antrim, New Hampshire; Crotched Mountain in Greenfield, New Hampshire; and the Kurn Hattin children's home in Westminster, Vermont. We also provide innovative, supportive programming to children of incarcerated adults through our Girl Scouts Beyond Bars program in St. Albans, Vermont.

Timely topics such as computer science and technology, adventure sports, advocacy and political science, dating violence awareness, and entrepreneurship have joined traditional program opportunities offered to girls, from leadership, outdoor skills, wildlife, the environment, travel, first aid and disaster preparedness to water sports. The Girl Scout Cookie program remains the leading financial literacy program for girls in the country, helping girls learn money management, salesmanship and marketing, goal-setting and teamwork. Every activity is girl driven, so girls learn to make good choices and discover their potential as a leader.

Community service is a vital part of our mission to "make the world a better place." Girl Scouts participate in thousands of hours of service projects every year, directly benefiting their community, the state, our country and the world.

Our Impact

- More than 50 million women in the United States have enjoyed Girl Scouting.
- 68 percent of the women in the US Congress are former Girl Scouts.
- 82 percent of high-achieving Girl Scout alumnae believe that Girl Scouting influenced their success.
