

Planning a Camporee

Service Unit camporees are a great way to share Girl Scout sisterhood in the great outdoors!

A camporee gathers Girl Scout troops for camping and activities, generally with a common theme, working towards building courage, confidence, character, and leadership while having fun! It is an opportunity to share Girl Scout sisterhood in the great outdoors.

A camporee differs from troop camping in that it is a gathering of multiple troops sharing camp activities that might be planned around a theme, or be a competition-style event. Many camporees have a day event for Daisy Girl Scouts, a one-night overnight for Brownies, and two-night overnight for Juniors and older.

Camporees can help older Girl Scouts learn to plan and lead activities; help volunteers new to camping start to experience the outdoors; help younger Girl Scouts learn new camp skills; and provide opportunities for older Girl Scout to gather, challenge, and improve their outdoor skills.

What is a camporee?

A camporee is a local gathering of Girl Scout troops, consisting of troops from the same Service Unit (SU), for a weekend of camping and common activities, usually planned by the older Girl Scouts in the SU.

This guide will help you get started planning a camporee, and explains the process of reserving a GSGWM property for a camporee.





Steps to Planning Your Camporee

Choose a theme

Engage Girl Scouts, volunteers, and families in brainstorming a theme or activities for the camporee. Once the theme is chosen, activities and ideas for evening programs or even meals will begin to form. Remind all the volunteers of the outdoor camping training requirements - Outdoor Adventure Workshop (OAW), Basic Outdoor Living Skills (BOLS), and/or Advanced Outdoor Living Skills (AOLS) and let them plan ahead for training. OAW is available online anytime and is free, BOLS is offered regularly at each GSGWM property in both the spring and fall. AOLS is offered every September, and January. Choose a Camporee Coordinator

While you are choosing a theme, choose a Camporee Coordinator. This adult volunteer will be the person who ensures your property reservation is complete, confirms any certification needed, communicates dates and makes the reservation for the property. The Camporee Coordinator will also need to coordinate other volunteers and girls who might take on leadership for planning meals, activities, creating flyers, tracking troop/girl reservations and payments, and more.

Make a reservation for your preferred property

Don't delay! Once you have an idea of dates, be sure to make the reservation. Check the <u>Property</u> <u>Reservation calendar</u> to see available dates and sites for GSGWM properties. Once you have your dates in mind, fill out the <u>Property Reservation Form.</u> When you make your reservation for the property, you'll also be able to choose any specialty activities and equipment. On the Tuesday after your request was submitted, you will receive a confirmation with a detailed invoice and instructions to pay. A payment of 50% of the rental total is due upon confirmation. The remaining payment must be paid in full at least two weeks prior to your rental. You will be able to release "held" spaces from your rental reservation or add additional items if they are available $u \sim \ddagger t$ †irtwo weeks before your camporee. Once final payment is made, all spaces are yours and you will not be able to have fees refunded.

Plan your activities

Work with your camporee committee members and the Girl Scouts' ideas to plan out your weekend, your activities, and your budget. Check with <u>Safety Activity Checkpoints</u> to be sure you are meeting safety ratios, Girl Scouts engaged in activities are the right grade levels, and check for any certifications required. Be sure your payment schedule and fees will pay for the rental of the property, food, activities, and anything else you have planned.

Four weeks before your camporee

Review and update your emergency plans and turn in certifications. The Camporee Coordinator must submit the camporee emergency plans and any certifications required (for lifeguards, health care, etc) not later than 4 weeks before the date of the camporee, to Customer Care. This includes being sure every troop has a volunteer trained in OAW (for one-night overnights in Adirondacks or cabins, and campfires and stick cooking) or BOLS (two or more camping nights, tent camping, cooking with Dutch ovens, propane stoves, box ovens, buddy burners). This is a good time to also remind troops about health forms and having a first aider with their troop.

Two weeks before your camporee

Be sure to pay your balance due for the property rental. Camporee Coordinators will receive a reminder before the due date. Camporees not paid in full by the due date are at risk of being canceled. If there is a reason the deadline cannot be met, please reach out to Customer Care to discuss options.

Enjoy your camporee

The Thursday before your camporee, you'll get the codes and reminders for any buildings and spaces on the GSGWM property you need. We'll also check in to let you know who to expect if you scheduled to have staff lead any activities for you. Be sure you communicate your emergency plan with the Girl Scouts and volunteers on property for your camporee.

After your camporee

We'll follow up with an online evaluation about the property; but you'll want to connect with the Camporee Committee to record notes, ideas, successes, and celebrate your event! Be sure to share photos, things you learned, and feedback with us, too!

Important reminders

Health Supervisor: For camporees of over 200 people (adults and campers together) and if EMS is more than 30 minutes away, a camporee will need to have a dedicated health care supervisor who is an Advanced First Aider on property during the event and available. This Advanced First Aider must have advanced training such as Wilderness First Aid, Wilderness First Responder, EMT, LNA, RN, Physician; and their certification must be turned in to council not later than 4 weeks prior to the camporee. If EMS is less than 30 minutes away, a General First Aider should be present with Girl Scout members. If more than 200 people at an event, an Advanced First Aider should be added to the General First Aider for every 200 people.

Farnsworth Kitchen: In order to use the Farnsworth kitchen to serve meals at a camporee, at least one adult supervising the kitchen must be trained in ServSafe® kitchen and food safety. If you are using a food service provider who is using the kitchen, they must have a ServSafe® certificate. All certifications are required to be turned in to council not later than 4 weeks prior to the camporee.

Planning your first camporee?

Here are some key points gathered from experienced Camporee Coordinators.

Keep it Girl-Led

A camporee event can be as elaborate or simple as you want it, but the most important element is that a camporee should be girl-led. This helps pass the camporee tradition along from camper to camper, and keeps the event focused on the Girl Scouts and their goals from start to finish.

Choose Your Focus

Decide on whether your camporee will be skill-based or focused on fun activities. Brainstorm themes and ideas for activities. Let Girl Scouts plan fun activities because the planning required to teach skills and do badge work can be a lot for first-time volunteers and their troops. However, if you are interested in doing a skill-based camporee, reach out to your volunteers—you may be surprised at how much their expertise can help!

Some past themes for Camporees: Storybook Tales; Secret Agent; Little House on the Prairie/Settler Days; TV shows (Survivor, Lost); Books and Movies (Harry Potter); Badge Themes (Outdoor Art).

Create a Camporee Committee

Whether you are planning a skill-based camporee or fun activities camporee, reaching out to Girl Scouts and volunteers and having them join the Camporee Committee will make planning a whole lot easier. Having multiple adults really helps in splitting up the responsibilities, and lets Girl Scouts and volunteers share their skills and interests!

Plan Ahead

Set your dates and start promoting the event early. For a May camporee, we recommend starting to plan not later than December. Plan for one meeting a month through February, and more frequent meetings leading up to the date. Remember to plan to market the event and plan for how Girl Scouts/troops will register.

Stay Flexible

So many unexpected things can happen while planning, so it's best to stay upbeat and flexible. One year, it might rain the entire weekend, and everything you plan might have to be modified. The Girl Scouts will still have a good time, and the adverse conditions might show their commitment to making camporee a fun learning experience despite what the weather throws at them. Another time, it might be too hot, or a featured event or speaker might not work out.

Channel Your Love for Girl Scouting

Be sure that camporee is something the Girl Scouts and volunteers have a love for! From the theme they choose, the activities they plan, the camaraderie of the volunteers, let the camporee reflect your passion for Girl Scouting and sharing the outdoors with Girl Scouts.
